

DATABASES REQUIRING PASSWORDS

There are four databases and one online encyclopaedia to which we subscribe.

Our databases are accessed through the [UQL Cyberschool](#) page:

ANZRC - Australian /New Zealand Reference Centre
(Contact the Resource Centre for Usernames and Passwords)

This gives access to a wide range of full text Australian and international periodicals.

At the UQL Cyberschool site select Australian /New Zealand Ref Centre to access the ANZRC collection.

Periodicals accessed include: *Australian Geographic, Australian Personal computer, Bulletin, Ecodate, Geodate, Legaldate, Motor, Street machine, Time, Archaeology, Astronomy, Economist, Fantasy&Science Fiction, Golf World, History Today, Internet World, Rolling Stone, Science World, Sports Illustrated, Women's Sport & Fitness, and an extensive International Reference Collection. A large number of newspapers can also be accessed including Courier Mail, Sunday Mail, and The Australian.*

This includes the 'Australia/New Zealand Points of View' an excellent source of topical material ideal for any study of current issues and debating.

Expanded Academic Int'l Ed – (Contact the Resource Centre for Usernames and Passwords)

This gives access to a database of full text periodical titles at a tertiary level.

Select "Databases" (choose your school). When searching choose "Full Text" in the search options. Periodicals accessed include: *Discover, Economist, Geographical Magazine, Greece & Rome, Habitat Australia, History Today, National Geographic, New Statesman, Popular Mechanics, Popular Science, Psychology Today.*

Gale World History in Context – (Contact the Resource Centre for Usernames and Passwords)

This gives access to guided searches on historical topics, events and personalities. It separates search results up into (i) reference materials, (ii) periodicals, (iii) primary sources and (iv) maps and multimedia. Search hits are categorised as either topic/event overview, country overview, statistical survey, narrative biography. This is an excellent introductory or advanced database for History-related subject matter. Junior and Senior History/Humanities students will find this site of immeasurable benefit.

JSTOR

This link will take you to the JSTOR registration site. You must be logged on to the BSHS network to setup your account for JStore.

You need to register as a user here. Once this is done, each time you use JSTOR you will need to log on using this information. You **must** use your school email address to register.

Make note of your user ID (I suggest making it the same as your school network ID) and password somewhere safe, as we cannot reset it for you.

An excellent general site with a wide range of specific information as well as ebooks, research material and guides, primary sources, up to date topical information. World Book is an excellent starting point for students looking for a topic overview prior to more in depth research.

OTHER AREAS OF ACCESS TO RESEARCH DATABASES

Brisbane City Council Library

Provides access to an extensive range of databases for BCC library card holders.

Using the internet access the BCC library home page <http://www.brisbane.qld.gov.au/> and select search the Catalogue, at the catalogue page select Databases. You will need to provide a current BCC library card number as your password to the databases.

State Library of Queensland

Provides access to an extensive range of databases.

You will need a State Library e-services card for access (you can apply for an e-services card at the State Library or online)

Go to <http://www.slq.qld.gov.au/> and search for eresources.

National Library of Australia

Provides access to a wide range of databases (this collection is less general than the above collections, it has many very subject specific databases, good for high level research)

Go to <http://www.nla.gov.au/> , and use either the Record Search facility that will allow you to search the entire database, or Vrrroom (Virtual Reading Room), especially designed for high school students.

You will need to register in order to save documents (registration is free).
